# God Saw


God saw the road was getting rough, The hill was hard to climb: He gently closed those loving eyes And whispered "Peace Be Thine."

## **Obituary**



Sis. Willie Pearl Bates Daniels was born January 11, 1932 to the late Howard Bates and Fannie Viola Hurst Bates in Peoria, Mississippi. On Thursday, May 7, 2009, at the Baton Rouge General Hospital, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, the angels of eternal life blew their trumpets and called her home to be with the Lord. Sis. Daniels now resides in heaven with the same compassion, thoughtfulness, kindness, care, and benevolence in which she exhibited during her life on earth.

Sis. Daniels accepted Christ at an early age, and became a life-long member of the Tickfaw Missionary Baptist Church. She served faithfully as a deaconess and church announcement clerk until her health began to decline. She later joined the First United Methodist Church of Baker, Louisiana as an affiliate (watch care) member under the leadership of Rev. Gene Rives.

Sis. Daniels was a member of the Amite County Teachers Association and the Mississippi State Teachers Association. She was also a member of the Heroines of Jericho Tickfaw Court #474 for more than fifty years, during which time she held various offices, including the Most Ancient Matron and District Secretary.

Sis. Daniels was united in holy matrimony to the late Phillip Daniels. To this union, two daughters were born -- Delois Diane Daniels and Vera Inez Daniels.

Sis. Daniels attended Europe Bates School, Liberty, Mississippi and Waynesboro High School, Waynesboro, Mississippi. She received a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education from Alcorn State University (formerly, Alcorn A & M College), Lorman, Mississippi; and engaged in further study at Mississippi University for Women (formally Mississippi State College for Women) Columbus, Mississippi and the University of Southern Mississippi, Hattiesburg, Mississippi. Sis. Daniels was employed with the Amite County Public School System as an elementary school teacher where she nurtured, inspired, and educated hundreds of students. She retired from the Amite County Public School System in 1991, along side her sister (Inez Bates Sutton) after 37 years of service. After retirement she opened her own business "Simply Unique Boutique" in Baker, Louisiana, and managed it until her health began to decline. She enjoyed traveling, fishing, gardening, writing poems, speeches, and making floral arrangements.

Sis. Daniels was preceded in death by her loving husband, Phillip Daniels, father and mother, Howard Bates and Fannie Viola Hurst Bates; five brothers, Bernell, Claude, Ellis Ray, Curtis, and Marshall Bates; and sister, Ollye Bates Scott.
